What kind of sex-ed keeps us healthy?



"Comprehensive sexuality education (CSE) is a curriculum-based process of teaching and learning about the cognitive, emotional, physical and social aspects of sexuality. It aims to equip children and young people with knowledge, skills, attitudes and values that will empower them to: realize their health, well-being and dignity; develop respectful social and sexual relationships; consider how their choices affect their own well-being and that of others; and, understand and ensure the protection of their rights throughout their lives." ~UNESCO 2018



Why does sex-ed matter? Because, science!

Comprehensive sex-ed leads to:

- Building of stronger and healthier relationships
- Increased knowledge of our rights within sexual relationships
- Increased communication with parents about sex and relationships
- Greater effectiveness when managing risky situations
- Prevention of gender-based and intimate partner violence and discrimination
- Increased confidence, gender equality and ability to achieve goals

Not a matter of opinion: why LGBTQ+ inclusion is critical for all youth





In 2011, EGALE found that:

- 64% of LGBTQ+ students do not feel safe at school
- 70% of young people reported hearing discriminatory remarks against LGBTQ+ individuals on a daily basis and 10% reported hearing these from their educators and adults in school
- 74% of trans students, 55% of sexual minority students, and 37% from LGBTQ+ families report being verbally harassed because of their gender, sexual orientation, or family
- 21% of LGBQ students report physical abuse



Preventing violence and increasing safety

- A key intervention in preventing childhood sexual abuse, intimate partner violence and sexual violence
- Long-term health impacts
- Learning about bodies, bodily autonomy, safe/unsafe touch from a young age
- Providing vocabulary and tools to tell trusted adults when they need help
- Gives the language of consent
- Provides skills to nurture strong, respectful relationships
- It helps prevent violence and challenge rape culture and victim-blaming



What difference can sex-ed really make?





Every person should have agency, autonomy, and understanding over their own bodies. It helps them make informed choices and be better citizens overall. They end up treating themselves and others in a more kind, inclusive, and respectful way. This makes relationships in and out of the schools stronger and more resilient. Also, comprehensive sexuality education (or body science) will reduce health care costs when more people have access to it and are better informed. This is a win-win-win situation! (...) It helps build more resourced youth and adults in our communities.

Why isn't sex-ed a priority in Canada?



One of the reasons is that leaders across Canada are not treating it as a priority.

How do we know this?

- There is no national sex-ed strategy
- No mechanisms in place to ensure equal access to life-saving health information
- No provincial or territorial government is funding sex-ed on a large scale
- No standard M&E of sex-ed lessons
- No accountability mechanisms when sex-ed is sub-par or not taught
- No safeguards that would make sure LGBTQ+ students are getting sex-ed that speaks to them
- The federal government is not collecting national sexual health data needed to determine the results, gains, and gaps of sex-ed



Do we have a right to sex-ed?



Sex-ed is not about opinions or political agendas. It's about evidence, human rights, health, and gender equality.
